# **REFLECTION - 24TH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME**

All one must do is experience a heart attack to have new respect for your cardiologist. You not only recognize his medical education, but also the importance of your so-called "ticker" in a way not appreciated before the crisis. I know this personally.

In Our Lord's time, medicine was comparatively primitive. So, people regarded the heart as the seat of invisible realities, and it made you the person you are. People had a spiritual side, but never spoke of something called the "soul." Handicapped by this, when Jesus urged people to obey His controversial mandate about forgiveness, He appealed to their hearts. In our day, He might appeal to our deepest sensitivity, or our spiritual core. Nonetheless, there would still be His demand that there should be no place in us for "holding on to a grudge."

This matter of Christ-like forgiveness has all the difficulty of moving a mountain with a shovel. It also contradicts every natural impulse we have not to forgive. To hold on to a grudge, or devise ways to exact revenge against the offender. That behavior is often the "stuff" of courtroom confrontation. What keeps personal attorneys busy.

Our American psyche has a way of making us hell bent on protecting our rights. Christ is not against us having our rights. But He cannot tolerate our being "hell bent" on anything. He is both all-just and all-merciful.

But do we ever consider God's "rights"? After all, He is our creator. He made us from mere dust. Hasn't He then had the "right, so to speak" to call upon us, His creatures, to choose His way of thinking and acting? True as that is, notice how He "stands back" and grants us the power to disagree with Him! Amazing! But on our part, there lies sin, and every other evil.

Christopher de Vinck, a husband, father and grandfather, and veteran public-school teacher of 40 years, in his book, The Power of the Powerless, tells a simple but provocative story. He writes:

One spring afternoon my five-year-old son David and I were planting raspberry bushes along the side of the garage. A neighbor joined us for a few moments. David pointed to the ground. "Look Daddy! What's that?" I stopped talking to my neighbor and looked down. "A beetle." I said. David was impressed and pleased with the discovery of this fancy, colorful creature.

My neighbor lifted his foot and stepped on the insect, giving his shoe an extra twist in the dirt. "That ought to do it," he laughed. David looked up at me, waiting for an explanation, a reason. That night, just before I turned off the light in his bedroom, David whispered "I liked that beetle, Daddy." "I did too," I whispered back.

Deinck concludes his story by writing, "We have the power to choose." God love you and give you the grace to choose wisely.
