




REFLECTION 30TH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME

Fans of certain TV series will tell you how distracted and annoyed they become when little "teaser" messages suddenly appear in the lower right-hand corner of the screen. They distract from the main action on screen. One of modern life's small yexations.

Two thousand years ago, when that "scholar of the law" Pharisee, whom we might consider a "PhD" on the subject, approached Jesus with his question, he was coming from a background of teachers who had concocted 613 laws that covered almost any aspect of Jewish life. The main tenet of Moses' law had gotten lost. This unnamed man wanted Jesus' take on the matter. We see here that he received an answer from Our Lord in short order.

That Pharisee's motives here were mixed at best. He knew that Jesus had "silenced" the Sadducees, his perpetual adversaries. Anything to build up the Pharisee camp by tearing down their opponents! But he didn't realize that in Jesus he was up against a person who saw beneath the surface of anyone's motives or conduct. I believe that there was a bit of a scold in the blunt reply Jesus made. No friendly introduction or follow-up praise.

Of course, the whole scene has implications for us and our thinking about religion and the things of God. Do we know what the main two-sided command of God is? I believe we almost automatically observe that first part about loving God with all our heart, soul and mind. This even though we sometimes choose other things as our "gods"? Things like power, wealth and fame? But at least most of us try to have the right priorities.

But it's that second commandment, the one Our Lord says is "like" the first, that of loving our neighbor as ourselves, which gets most of us in the jungle of guilt. No matter how hard we try, the daily presence of shall I say "pesky or annoying" people often make us fall into rash judgment. That's when we must remember what Jesus said about every other law depends on the first two.

One day a certain old rich man of a miserable disposition visited a rabbi, who took the rich man by the hand and led him to a window. "Look out there," he said. The rich man looked into the street. "What do you see?" asked the rabbi. "I see men, women, and children." answered the rich man. Again, the rabbi took him by the hand and this time led him to a mirror. "Now what do you see?" "Now I see myself," the rich man replied.

Then the rabbi said, "Behold, in the window there is glass, and in the mirror, there is glass. But the glass of the mirror is covered with a little silver, and no sooner is the silver added than you cease to see others, but you see only yourself."
