



### REFLECTION - 11TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Now this is how it is." That is what He said. That is what Jesus the Son of God said. The people at that time listened to Him but did not all hear. We in our time must both listen and hear, for our lives in heaven depend on it.

In this case He was speaking about the kingdom of God. We already know that He was not speaking of landed territory. We heard Him say to Pilate: "My kingdom is not of this world." What He spoke of here was the beginning of the kingdom being very small, but it would grow and grow until its reach was worldwide.

We also know that the Kingdom of God is not limited to the Roman Catholic Church, but that it subsists there. Just as we see the growth of our Church over more than 20 centuries, so we see the spread of God's kingdom in multiple places. It really exists in the hearts and minds of all people who honor God by a godly life full of truth and justice.

We do not know what God has in mind for those who outrightly reject the kingdom when they hear of it but that is hardly our judgement to make. What is our duty, beginning with our baptism, it is to live as Jesus taught.

The problem we have in choosing the way of Christ is that it is often very difficult. Difficulty is abhorrent to a soft culture like ours that prefers easy living. In a recent conversation I had with a funeral director, he spoke of occasional family groups who do not gather after the burial for a family meal. They want the whole matter of a loved one's funeral to be over and done with quickly, presumably so that they can all return to preferred choices of separate lives with little connection

I grant you that such happenings are rare. Most families come together after the burial to celebrate their loved one's journey home to God and to experience their common union. But this is just one small example of how the values of God's kingdom can be so decidedly denied. Our present-day culture makes it easy to forget the kingdom because it denies that God has any place in our lives.

So, we come to the point in any conversation about God's kingdom where we must not only remind ourselves of our membership in it but also to examine how we have exhibited our acceptance of it. Then we know where we can improve on doing our lifetime task, which is to respond to God's inimitable love for us. Ours to love Him back with a generous return.

Once upon a time a father went into a toy store to buy his son a birthday present. The salesman showed him a new educational toy. It came unassembled, but no matter how the child put the pieces together, they wouldn't fit. You see, the toy was designed to teach the child how to deal with life.

Such is the predicament of a person who chooses to live without God. He is never able to really put his life together. God love you and give you His peace. *Rev. Leonard N. Peterson*
